


Family & Pet Friends

Thanks to our wonderful English teachers, Miss Marley and Mrs. Sykes, and Mrs. Koon in study hall, we both made high marks.</p> <p>Did our class really need an assistant principal? There wasn’t one at the “old” high school! Who can forget Mrs. Joyce Gregg, office secretary (and hall monitor and school warden, especially to girls)?</p> <p>The new High School was only 3 blocks from my house, but I still loved a ride home. We were so excited being the first Graduating Class of the new school, but we were all surprised by the “closed” lunch hour and changed the name to “Siberia” High.
